Otherwise, the big news in Macomb County this week is our bid to become the next headquarters for the [United States Space Command](#) (USSPACECOM). USSPACECOM is the newest of the eleven unified commands in the Department of Defense (DoD). USSPACECOM increases the ability of the Joint Force to project power and influence, reduces decision timelines for space operations, and brings focused attention to defending U.S. interests in space. Establishing USSPACECOM is a critical step in accelerating the ability of the Joint Force to defend vital national interests and deter adversaries. USSPACECOM is temporarily headquartered in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Working with our partners and the city of Sterling Heights, we are in the running to host their new headquarters. - The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services just issued important guidance for the holiday season. - Halloween is still on in Michigan, and with a few minor adjustments to your traditions, you can ensure the safety and health of all those around you. - Macomb County Planning and Economic Development has opened a new grant program to help small businesses dealing with the impact of COVID-19. This is the final opportunity for these organizations to apply for assistance. The grant application process will remain open through November 2, 2020 at 12 p.m. Businesses with 50-500 employees may be eligible for grants up to \$10,000. Businesses with 1-49 employees may be eligible for grants up to \$5,000. [Learn more](#).



- Medicare open enrollment assistance is now open and runs through December 7. This is the opportunity for Medicare participants to review their plan options and make changes for 2021. The Macomb County Office of Senior Services has a trained, unbiased team of advocates in place to assist with the process. In-person appointments can be scheduled with the office by calling 586-469-5228. You must be 60 years or older and a Macomb County resident. An option to meet with an advocate by phone is also available.
- The Macomb County Health Department and its community partners have launched a new Community Health Survey to hear from everyone who lives, works and plays in Macomb County. All it takes is 10 minutes. Make your voice heard by [clicking here](#).



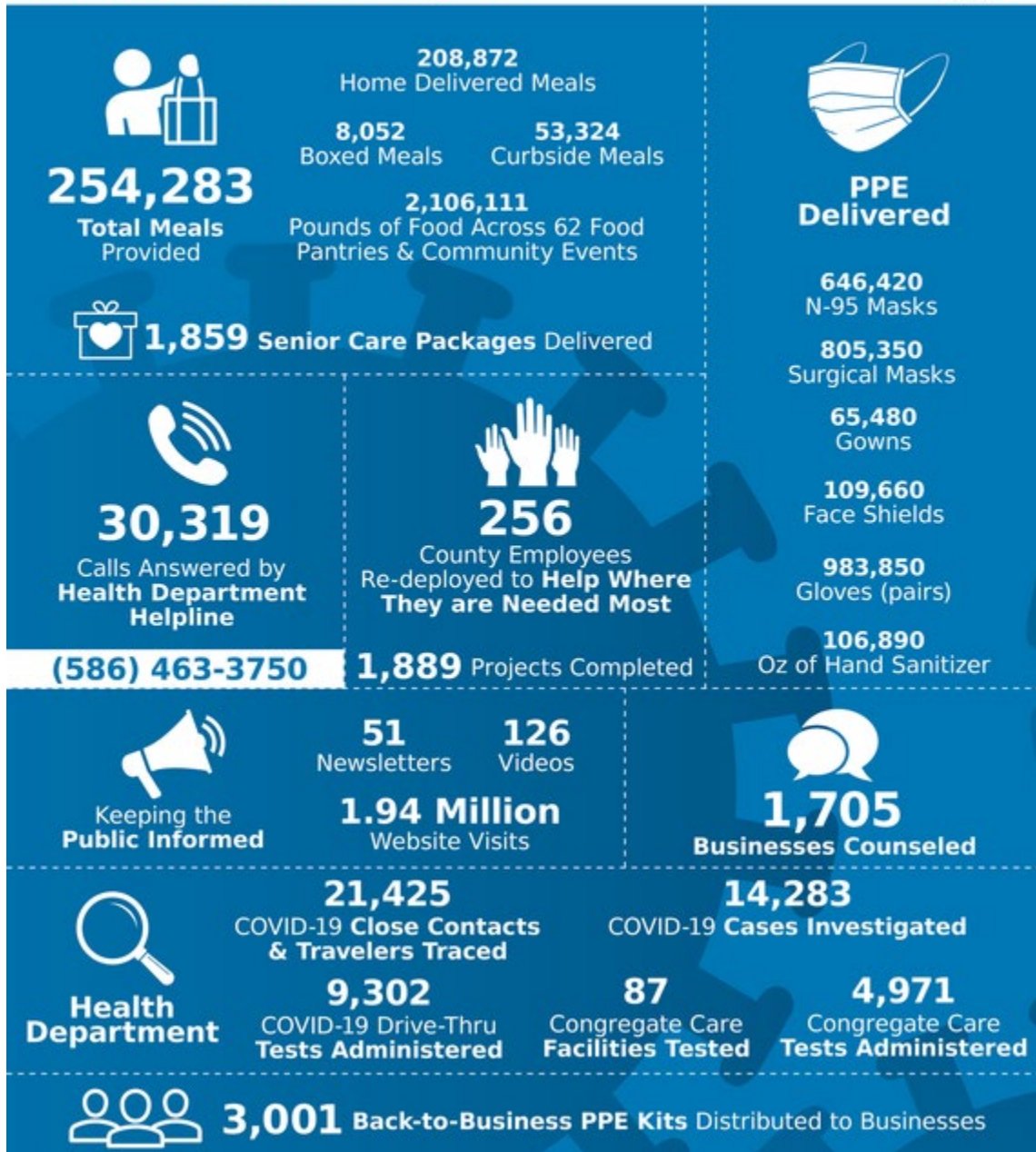
