We ve seen several positive developments this week when it comes to the COVID-19 situation. First and foremost, a vaccine was reviewed by federal agencies and given <u>Emergency Use</u>
Authorization for the public. This is incredible news for our country, our state and for our community.

Macomb County will be receiving our first shipment of vaccines very soon. And while there is no federal or local mandate requiring vaccination, there is broad support among public health and medical professionals encouraging its use. A tiered approach and prioritization for distribution has been recommended by federal agencies and the MDHHS. This first round of vaccines received by our Health Department will be for emergency medical service providers. Extensive plans to ensure a seamless roll out to the group has been developed.

Please know - the vaccine will be available for the general public in the coming months, but we must continue to prioritize those who are most at-risk for infection first, so I ask that you remain patient. In the meantime, talk to your health care provider if you have questions. And of course, stay tuned to MacombGov.org for further updates and information.

In other positive news, Macomb County so new COVID-19 testing location opened on Monday at the former site of the Baker College Auto Lab on S. Gratiot in Clinton Township. This facility will provide protection from winter weather for both our workers and the individuals who visit us for testing. I am incredibly thankful to Baker College and Clinton Township for their help with this location. I am also proud of the team that made it all possible, from our Health Department to our Department of Roads, this was truly a collaborative effort that showcases our adaptability in dealing with the pandemic.

In closing, I do like to touch on one more positive item - it appears that COVID-19 numbers across the state are headed in the right direction. This is evidence that we are all taking extra precautions to keep ourselves, our family and our friends safe. I ask that you continue to heed the advice of our public health professionals so we can continue down the right path.

- On Monday, December 14, Macomb County opened its new COVID-19 drive-through testing site at the former location of the Baker College Auto Lab at 34401 S. Gratiot Ave., Clinton Twp., MI 48035. This site replaces the county sprevious testing site located at

the former Macomb County Juvenile Court Building in Mount Clemens. Take note of this map if you plan to get tested, as it lists the entrance and flow of traffic. And remember, testing will continue to be offered Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. • 3 p.m. No appointment is necessary and individuals without symptoms of COVID-19 can be tested.



- With the Futures for Frontliners application deadline approaching, frontline workers are encouraged to take the next step in their educational journey and apply for free college tuition towards an associate degree or industry-recognized certificate at community college by Dec. 31 even if they have not completed their high school diploma. 
