Yesterday we joined with the City of Sterling Heights and SMART to <u>announce</u> the county's second community-based COVID-19 vaccination site for those aged 60 and up. As I've said before, senior citizens are a priority for Macomb County as they are our most at-risk population when it comes to the coronavirus. So please know that we will continue to look for opportunities to vaccinate this population safely and to advocate for more vaccines on their behalf.

This is great timing, as this week is Macomb Community Action's annual Walk for Warmth. For 31 years, MCA has hosted this event with the goal of raising funds to help low-income individuals who have trouble keeping their heat running during the winter. The event will run through February 27, so there is still plenty of time to register, donate or even sign on as a sponsor. Important Things to Know

The Macomb County Health Department yesterday announced a new partnership with the City of Sterling Heights that will create a new community-based COVID-19 vaccination site at the Sterling Heights Senior Center (40200 Utica Rd, Sterling Heights, MI 48313). The site will be staffed by trained health professionals from the Sterling Heights Fire Department and transportation services can be provided through SMART. Appointments are required; the site is not open to walk-ups. To make an appointment, residents aged 60 and up can call

the **SMART Vaccine Line at 586-421-6579 or email <u>macombvaccine@smartbus.org</u> with their name, phone number, address and date of birth. Registrants will be added to the SMART wait list, and Macomb County staff will call eligible responders to schedule appointments as they become available. Appointments will be made at either the Sterling Heights location or the community-based drive through site in Richmond.**

Seniors are also encouraged to register for COVID-19 vaccine appointments through other Macomb County locations as well:

- In partnership with the Macomb County Health Department, Meijer Pharmacy is registering individuals and reaching out to make appointments at one of several Macomb County stores. To register, individuals can text COVID to 75049, <u>go online</u> or simply visit a local Meijer pharmacy and ask to register.
- Rite Aid Pharmacy is also registering individuals who are aged 65 and above and will contact those who are currently eligible based on availability of the vaccine. To register for an appointment, <u>click here</u>.

FAQ: Will a COVID-19 vaccine alter my DNA? No.

COVID-19 mRNA vaccines do not change or interact with your DNA in any way. mRNA vaccines teach our cells how to make a protein that triggers an immune response. The mRNA from a COVID-19 vaccine never enters the nucleus of the cell, which is where our DNA is kept. This means the mRNA cannot affect or interact with our DNA in any way. Instead, COVID-19 mRNA vaccines work with the body's natural defenses to safely develop immunity to disease. Learn more about how COVID-19 mRNA vaccines work <u>here</u>.

<u>Macomb County Animal Control</u> (MCAC), with the help of a generous donor, has launched a new Pet Retention Program. Funds for this initiative will be used to assist pet owners who, as a result of the pandemic, are struggling to care for their pets or are at risk of having to surrender their pets. These pet owners can qualify for up to \$500, which can be used to subsidize an animal's medical care, provide items for the animal's wellness or for training. The program is open to all Macomb County residents. MCAC also extends a helping hand to families and their pets through its Pet Food Pantry. 
