Important Things to Know

In observation of the Memorial Day weekend, the Macomb County Health Department – including the COVID-19 testing site in Clinton Township – will be closed May 29 - 31. Normal operations will resume Tuesday, June 1.



THE MACOMB COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT WILL BE CLOSED

Saturday, May 29 - Monday, May 31.

The Macomb County Health Department is now accepting COVID-19 vaccination appointments for anyone aged 12 and older. IMPORTANT: Only the Pfizer vaccine is approved for use for those aged 12 to 17. Individuals in this age range who wish to be vaccinated MUST select the Verkuilen Building in Clinton Township, the SW Center in Warren/Majestic Plaza or the Lakeside Mall drive-thru when they make their appointment. All minors must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Same day, and Saturday appointments are available in some locations. To make an appointment, go to macombgov.org/covidvaccine.

MDHHS has updated its COVID-19 Gatherings and Face Masks epidemic order, eliminating outdoor capacity limits and increasing indoor social gatherings, including weddings, conferences and funerals, to 50% capacity. Under the new order, which goes into effect Tuesday, June 1, and continues through Thursday, July 1, masks will continue to be required indoors for individuals who are not yet vaccinated. **Learn more**.



Beginning June 1:



- There will no longer be capacity limits outdoors.
- There will no longer be capacity limits at residential gatherings.
- Indoor establishments will be at 50% capacity.
- Social gatherings will now be regulated only by the venue.
 - For example, guidelines or rules for an indoor wedding or conference would be set by the establishment in which it is hosted.
- Face masks continue to be required for non-vaccinated individuals indoors.




Beginning July 1, all broad epidemic orders will be lifted.



Important CDC Guidance for Unvaccinated People: If you haven't been vaccinated yet, wear a mask that covers your nose and mouth to help protect yourself and others. Masks should be worn in addition to staying at least 6 feet apart, especially around people who don't live with you. Get a COVID-19 vaccine as soon as you can. Being in crowds makes you more likely to get or spread COVID-19, so avoid crowds and poorly ventilated indoor spaces. And wash your hands often with soap and water, or use hand sanitizer if soap and water aren't available. Learn more.

From the Health Department Helpline, the top question of the week: "I am fully vaccinated. I had an antibody test to see if I was immune, but the results were negative for antibodies. Why?" The answer? Antibody tests have not been approved to assess your response to the vaccine. Some antibody tests only detect natural infection.
