Important Things to Know

ARE YOU AGED 12+ WITH A COMPROMISED IMMUNE SYSTEM?

HAVE YOU RECEIVED TWO DOSES OF THE PFIZER OR MODERNA COVID-19 VACCINE?

A 3rd dose of the COVID-19 vaccine has been approved by the FDA and CDC for these individuals. This includes people who have received solid organ transplants, people who have an active or untreated HIV infection or people who are in active treatment for cancer.



The Macomb County Health Department is scheduling appointments for third doses of the COVID-19 vaccine for immunocompromised individuals. If you have questions about your eligibility, talk to your health care provider. You can also learn more at macombgov.org/VaccineCentral and make an appointment at macombgov.org/healthappointment.

ANSWER: Simply put, this confirms what we've heard for months: The vaccine is safe and effective. When the pandemic hit, scientists leveraged decades of mRNA research and groundwork to create a COVID-19 vaccine. Months of clinical trials were conducted, and eventually an Emergency Use Authorization was granted by the FDA in December 2020. In May 2021, with six months of follow-up data, Pfizer submitted their application for full approval, which the FDA recently announced for individuals aged 16 and older. For those who were holding out for full approval, now is the time to get vaccinated. As we head into the fall season, with colder temperatures and more indoor activities, we need to take proactive steps to protect ourselves and others. The Macomb County Health Department is here to help with quick and easy appointments and vaccinations distributed by friendly health care professionals.
