
# HAVE YOU RECEIVED TWO DOSES OF THE PFIZER OR MODERNA COVID-19 VACCINE?

A 3rd dose of the COVID-19 vaccine has been approved by the FDA and CDC for these individuals. This includes people who have received solid organ transplants, people who have an active or untreated HIV infection or people who are in active treatment for cancer.



The Macomb County Health Department is scheduling appointments for third doses of the COVID-19 vaccine for immunocompromised individuals. If you have questions about your eligibility, talk to your health care provider. **From the CDC**: The Delta variant is more dangerous than other variants of the virus that causes COVID-19. Slow the spread of Delta by getting vaccinated as soon as you can. Wear a mask indoors in public if you're in an area of substantial or high transmission, even if you're fully vaccinated. **Learn more**.



ANSWER: If you have had a "wait and see" approach to the vaccine, the results are in -the COVID-19 vaccines work and they are safe. The COVID-19 vaccines are definitely working and provide your best protection against severe disease, hospitalization, and death. In fact, according to the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, from January to July 2021, unvaccinated Michiganders accounted for 98% of COVID cases, 95% of hospitalizations and 96% of deaths. While the CDC and the experts who developed the vaccines continue to see stable and highly effective protection against hospitalizations and severe outcomes for people who are fully vaccinated, they are now seeing signs of a decline in vaccine effectiveness over time against mild and moderate COVID-19 infection, a good early indicator of the need for a booster dose. Booster doses are common for many vaccines - for example, people are recommended to get a flu shot every year, and boosters such as Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis) are part of the routine immunization schedule for adults and children. So if the FDA and CDC recommend a third dose, it is to help ensure your ongoing protection against COVID-19, and you should get your booster. If you have any questions or would like to discuss the vaccine, contact your health care provider. To make an appointment, visit macombgov.org/VaccineCentral.
