COVID-19 has impacted every aspect of our community - including municipal budgets. In Macomb County, we feel confident in our finances for 2020, but in 2021 and 2022, we will likely face some challenges. This is why I am again reminding our residents to fill out their census forms. As I've said before: "Census 2020 helps bring back the money." So if we all fill out this questionnaire, we can receive our fair share of federal funds.

Census data influences how more than \$675 billion is distributed to states and localities each year. This can benefit roads, education, transportation, small businesses, food assistance and medical services. Right now, Macomb County ranks 19th in the nation for response rates. That means 70.4 percent of our residents have completed their census form. But the county's goal is to get as close to 100 percent as possible, so if you or someone you know has not yet completed the census form, now is the time to do so. There are several options for filling out the questionnaire. You can learn more here.
